Short Description: Computer systems programming, including assembly language. Standard operating system calls, standard C library functions, performance measurement, code optimization, advanced control flow mechanisms, processes, threads, and low-level I/O.

Objectives: Upon the successful completion of the course, the student will be familiar with the enduring concepts underlying computer systems from the programmer's point of view.

Textbook: Computer Systems: A Programmer's Perspective, by Bryant and O'Hallaron. **Required.**

Paper Quiz: There will be a paper-only pass/fail quiz administered early in the semester. **Students must pass the quiz in order to pass the course.**

Homeworks / **Labs:** There will be a total of four labs. There will also be regular web-based quizzes. **Students** must receive at least one point on the first lab to pass the course.
